32 OKLAHOMA STATE UNIVERSITY — Blend of old and new campus. Student Union is show place. Stillwater.

33 United States — old part was used by first state legislature when Guthrie was Oklahoma capital. Guthrie.

34 FIRST STATE CAPITAL — Territorial capital and first state capital of Oklahoma. Site of writing of Oklahoma Constitution. Guthrie.

35 BOY'S BASEBALL CAMP — Baseball training for boys all ages. Chandler.

36 STROUD OVERPASS—Midway on Turner Turnpike.

37 ILNCOLN PARK ZOO — One of top rated zoos in America. Oklahoma City.

38 STATE CAPITOL COMPLEX AND OIL WELLS—Only state capital with producing oil wells on grounds. Oklahoma City.

39 RED ROCK CAMYON STATE PARK — Sandstone canyon fed by springs with big timber. Camping and picnic areas. 23 miles west, 5 south of Erene or 32 miles northwest of Anadarko. CONCHO INDIAN SCHOOL — Demonstration boarding school. Six miles north El Reno.

FORT RENO — Established 1874 during Cheyenne and Cimarron Rivers. 15 miles west, three north of Tulsa.

WILL ROGERS MEMORIAL — Museum of Will Rogers's belongings. Tomb of famed Oklahoma humorist-philosopher and wife. Claremore.

DAVIS GUN COLLECTION — Largest privately owned gun collection in U.S. Claremore.

PHILBROOK ART CENTER — Outstanding art exhibits. Annual all Indian show. Tulsa.

ROSE GARDENS — Outstanding rose gardens in southwest. Tulsa.

HEPBURN LAKE RECREATION AREA — Fishing. Camp and picnic areas. 11 miles west of Sapulpa.

POTTERY PLANT — Largest pottery plant in Oklahoma. Sapulpa.

OKLAHOMA STATE TECH—Largest state operated technical school in southwest. Okmulgee.

LAKE OKMULGEE STATE RECREATION AREA — Fishing and boating. Camp and Picnic areas. Five miles west of Okmulgee.

CREEK INDIAN CAPITOL — Built in 1878. Houses Creek Indian Museum. National Historic Landmark. Okmulgee.

FOUNTAINHEAD STATE PARK — On new lake OIL REFINERIES — Modern refineries, carbon black plants. Ponca City.
GRAIN ELEVATORS — Largest grain storage facilities in Oklahoma. Enid.
POTITERY PLANT — Unusual design in table ware and other pottery. Perry.
PAWNEE BILL HISTORIC SITE — Home of Pawnee Bill, Oklahoma Boomer, wildwest showman and rancher, atop Blue Hawk Peak. Furnishings, costumes and western paintings. One mile west Pawnee.
ROMAN NOSE STATE PARK — Spring-fed gypsum canyon. Modern lodge and cabins. Camp and picnic grounds. Five miles north of Watonga.

AMERICAN HORSE CANYON — Gypsum canyon — new Wildlife Department Lake and area. 15 miles south, 14 west of Watonga.

IESSE CHISHOLM GRAVE — The famous trail blazer died in 1868 at Left Hand Spring and was buried there. Marker at site. 11 south (Greenfield), 5 northeast of Watonga.

HENNESSEY MASSACRE — Site where wagon train led by Pat Hennessey was massacred by hostile Indians or outlaws. Grave on massacre site. Hennessey, 19 miles north of Kingfisher. Folt Lower Leaves of Control of Anadarko.

SEGER COLONY — Site of Indian Industrial School founded in 1885. Old church and some buildings still in use. 18 miles east, 4 north of Cordell.

CLINTON-SHERMAN AIR FORCE BASE — SAC base manned with B-52 Bombers. Eight miles west, 4 north of Cordell.

LITTLE RIVER STATE PARK—on new Little River Reservoir. Camping and picnic areas. 12 miles east of Norman. Open Summer 1965.

INDIAN HALL OF FAME — Busts of famous American Indians of all Tribes. Anadarko.

WATERMELON FESTIVAL — Harvest Festival of Watermelons. Rush Springs. 19 miles south of Chickasha.

SOUTHERN PLAINS INDIAN MUSEUM and CRAFT Chickasha.

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INDIAN CITY, U.S.A. — Collection of authentic Indian housing used before coming of whites to Oklahoma. Dances, curios, museum. Two miles south Anadarko. setting. Six miles north and 4 west of Lawton.

HOLY CITY — Site of annual Easter Pageant in Wichita Mountains. Six miles north, 10 west of Lawton.

U.S. ARMY ARTILLERY AND MISSILE CENTER MUSEUM COMPLEX — Includes Old Post at Fort Sill, Geronimo's grave, Old Stockade, gun halls and Cannon Walk. Four miles north Lawton.

MUSEUM OF THE GREAT PLAINS—Dedicated to the progress of man in the Great Plains. Lawton. MONUMENT HILL—Marker on top hill that was old Chisholm Trail Landmark. Just east of Addington, six miles north of Waurika.

ARBUCKLE OUTCROPPINGS — Geological wonderland with formations exposed that are thousands of feet below earth's surface a few miles away. Ardmore north to Davis.

TURNER FALLS — Oklahoma's best known waterfalls in Arbuckle Mountains. 18 miles north of Ardmore.

PLATT NATIONAL PARK — Area of cold springs used by Indians for healing. Sulphur. 10 TUCKER TOWER — Overlook building on Lake Murray housing a geological museum. In Lake Murray State Park, seven miles south of Ardmore. WOOLARCO MUSEUM — Tells history of man in United States from pre-historic to now. 13 miles southwest of Bartlesville.

10 SAGE HILLS STATE PARK — Rugged wooded hills with clear stream and small lake. Cabins, camping and picnic area. 16 miles northeast of Pawhuska.

OKLAHOMA'S FIRST COMMERCIAL OIL WELL — Site of first commercial producer. Bartlesville. WILL ROGERS STATE RECREATION AREA — On Oologah Reservoir. Camp and picnic areas. Birth-old of States of Will Rogers. 18 miles north of Claremore. OIL CAPITAL OF THE WORLD — Known far and wide as headquarters of OIL. Tulsa. GILCREASE MUSEUM — Excellent collection of western and Indian art and artifacts. Tulsa. KEYSTONE STATE PARK — Development being made on new Keystone Reservoir on the Arkansas Oklahoma City.

143 FAIR PARK — Grounds of Oklahoma State Fair include Oklahoma Science and Arts Building with Planetarium and the Oklahoma Art Center. Oklahoma City.

440 Oklahoma Historical BuilDING — Home of Oklahoma Historical Society and museum with outstanding Indian artifacts. Oklahoma City.

45 TIMKER AIRFORCE BASE—Largest military aviation maintenance and supply base in world. Oklahoma City.

46 UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA — Home of Stovall Museum — Big Red Football. Norman. miles southeast of Ada.

ARROWHEAD STATE PARK—On New Lake Eufaula.

New modern lodge and cabins. Camp and pionic area. 15 miles north of McAlester or 10 miles south Eufaula. Open Summer 1965.

76 Stylis DEN — Huge boulders with fantastic shapes strewn along Pennington Creek. Five miles north of Tishomingo.

BOGCY DEPOT STATE RECREATION AREA—Wooded area with picnic and camp grounds. Historic interest as stop on Butterfield Stage Line. Miami.
GLASS HOUSE RESTAURANT — Unusual structure astride Will Rogers Turnplike at midway point.
HONEY CREEK RECREATION AREA — Point into Grand Lake O' the Cherokees. Camping and picnic areas. 12 miles north, 2 west of Jay.
GRAND LAKE O' THE CHEROKEES — Oklahoma's most developed resort lake with more than 100 private resorts ringing its 1,300 mile shoreline. 15 miles east Vinita; eight miles southeast Miami, or 10 miles north Jay. Here mountains blend into wooded hills that slip away to high plains, all dotted with lakes, and history meets the space age face to face. 1 SAYINAW STATE RECREATION AREA — Camp and picnic areas on Spavinaw Creek. 18 miles west of lay or 24 miles northeast of Pryor.

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2 SEQUOYAH STATE PARK — On peninsula into Fort Gibson Reservoir. Modern lodge, water sports, camping and picnic areas. 9 miles east of Wagoner or 14 miles west of Tahlequah.

3 SEQUOYAH BAY STATE RECREATION AREA — On Fort Gibson Reservoir. Camp and Picnic areas. Eight miles north of Muskogee.

3 STRAWBERRY FESTIVAL — Held each spring at harvest time. Stilwell.

CHICKASAW INDIAN CAPITOL — Erected in 1897
by the Chickasaw Indian Nation. Building is now used as Johnston County Court House. Tishomingo.

MAGNOLIA TREES — Hundreds of Magnolia trees on campus of Southeastern State College and throughout city. Durant.

LAKE TEXOMA STATE PARK — On America's most popular man-made lake. Modern lodge and cabins, camp and picnic areas. 12 miles east of Madill.

LEAD AND ZINC MINES — Tri-State area. Display mine open to public. 12 miles northeast of Miami.

TWIN BRIGGS STATE RECREATION AREA — At head of Grand Lake O' the Cherokees. Camp and picnic areas. Five miles east and 6 south of Miami.

GIASS HOUSE RESTAURANT — Ilnusual structure

WORLD'S LONGEST CONVEYOR BELT — Located at cement plant. Ada.

ROBERT S. KERR CABIN—Birthplace of former Sen. Robert S. Kerr on 435 acre tract of land. Log cabin was reconstructed from original logs. Area also includes Kerr's tomb and the Southwest Regional Water Pollution Field Laboratory. Two miles southeast of Ada.
